

## Dr. Francis Schaeffer

and his wife, Edith founded the first L'Abri community in Switzerland some fifty years ago (*l'abri* is a French word meaning "the shelter"). Dr. Schaeffer was a Christian theologian and philosopher who also authored a number of books on theology, philosophy, general culture and the arts.

The L'Abri communities worldwide are study centers where individuals can seek answers to honest questions about God and the significance of human life. L'Abri believes that Christianity speaks to all aspects of life.

In the spirit of L'Abri, our conference is an opportunity through lectures, discussions, and personal interaction, to feed and hone the mind in an effort to deepen one's understanding of what it means to be a Christian in our time and culture.
